It always amazed me when he decided to grow a beard and when his twin brother came to visit he would have the exact same beard without knowing what Shine had decided. It has been a long time since I have seen his daughters from Michigan. They were two beautiful girls and I know he was proud of them. I always thought Patty should have been a model because she was so thin. He helped me build the basement for my house to provide a home for my family of five. I was dirt poor and without his help I would never have been able to start it. I could always count on him to show up early Sat. morning with coffee, a cooler of beer and a pint of moonshine. We would stop work when the block started looking crooked. He would buy charcoal kegs from Knoxville and put several gallons of shine in them and let it mellow out to a smooth taste. Shine was a self made man and worked hard all his life. He was a welder by trade but he could do about anything he put his mind to. I still have the belt buckles he made for me and my three boys while he worked at K-25. When I graduated from college the job I was able to take was because of his help so I have always been in his debt.
