You see a few weeks back I had been charged with painting the roof of the barn and I had left a section unpainted except for I LOVE NORA. I thought from that section only birds and airplanes could see it. As i turned back to face her I was searching for the right thing to say and she said with a smile it's okay we're just wondering how much longer you're planning on leaving it up there. I managed to say it'll be gone by the end of the day then drove away on the tractor. I just knew this was gonna be all over the neighborhood and throughout the school very shortly tho she must have told no one. After that anytime I was to happen upon her she would simply smile tenderly and wave. I am truly saddened to hear of her and her family's loss but I'm quite certain of this that her leaving this life at such a young age was too soon leaving me to believe that heaven was in desperate need of another angel.
